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ORPHEUS | PDX ANNOUNCES 2024 SEASON

Portland's new professional opera company, OrpheusPDX, continues its programming model of one classic work and one modern masterpiece, featuring both international and local artists.

(Portland, OR) — OrpheusPDX General and Artistic Director Christopher Mattaliano has officially announced the details of the 2024 season, the company's third. Performances of Handel's rarely performed *Acis, Galatea, and Polyphemus* and Hertzberg's fantasy *The Rose Elf*, will take place in August 2024, at Portland's 472-seat Lincoln Performance Hall. Subscription tickets are on sale now.

"I'm delighted to be producing our third season of professional opera at the wonderfully intimate Lincoln Hall. Both operas are splendid examples of magnificent music and theater, and we've assembled a stellar company of international guest artists together with members of Portland's rich community of local artists to bring these productions to life," Mattaliano said.

"This season, our two operas share elements of fantasy — one a mythical story taken from Ovid's *Metamorphoses* and the other based on a Hans Christian Andersen fairy tale," Mattaliano continued. "Both operas, although separated by more than three centuries, are prophetic in how they speak to us during this challenging time; they are set in a sometimes dark and dangerous world, yet each offers a vision of hope and compassion. It's a truly beautiful pairing that I'm very excited to share with Portland audiences."

Each season, OrpheusPDX produces one classic, 18th century opera and one great modern work. By experiencing them concurrently, audiences gain a distinct sense of the wonderful roots of opera and the beautifully varied ways the genre has transformed throughout the ages — in stunning, fully produced stagings that audiences expect from this rich art form.

Handel's early work *Acis, Galatea, and Polyphemus* kicks off the season with performances on August 3 and August 4. "The draw of this story lies in its depiction of love in all its manifestations." said Mattaliano. "This intensely dramatic opera is full of show-stopping arias, duets, and trios. It's a supreme vocal showcase for each singer that will captivate seasoned opera lovers and newcomers alike."

Hertzberg's *The Rose Elf* runs August 17 and August 18. "I'm particularly excited to introduce our audience to the music of David Hertzberg," said Mattaliano. "It is sparkling, shimmering, glowing, wildly energetic, and colorful. Audience members who love the music of Ravel, Debussy, and Richard Strauss are sure to enjoy David's music."

The great love between Acis and Galatea has been the subject of poems, paintings, operas, and statues throughout the centuries. When the jealous cyclops Polyphemus becomes crazed by his unrequited love for the sea-nymph Galatea, he kills her beloved, the mortal Acis. Devastated, Galatea transforms Acis into a river, in which she can live with him, forever united. Ultimately, in this timeless myth, love endures and overcomes all, even death.

Handel was so inspired by this story that he set it to music on three separate occasions. This is the first of those works, originally performed in 1708. Fans of Handel will recognize the acclaimed arias in this piece that he later used in *Agrippina*, *Rinaldo*, and several other of his masterworks. Polyphemus' dramatic entrance aria "Sibilar gli angui d'Aletto," is among his greatest and most celebrated arias. In a recent production, The San Francisco Chronicle praised this early piece as "a celebration of Handel's inexhaustible genius." *La Scena Musicale* raved that "the work has riches to burn — musical ideas, ingenious programmatic variety, viscerally arresting insights."

THE ROSE ELF

The Rose Elf follows a tiny elf who lives within a rose in a large, lush garden. When the elf witnesses a violent murder, it is forever changed. Moved, bewildered, and deeply affected, the elf strives to bring comfort and closure to the victim's beloved. Hertzberg said of this story, "In a time when many of us are living sub rosa, watching unfathomable devastation unfold from a distance ... it is my hope that this love-woven work of collective imagination can speak to the transformative power of nature and perhaps, in turn, offer a glimmer of hope."

The Rose Elf premiered in 2018 and was named "The Opera Event of 2018" by WQXR. The press reaction has been consistently ecstatic: The New York Times described the work as "voluptuous and passionate." Parterre called the opera "a marvel" saying: "Hertzberg is an absolute phenomenon. Such lush, decadent musical passages and ecstatic vocal lines I've rarely heard from a young composer. Hertzberg gave us splendid moments when I was sure I was hearing something straight out of the late Romantic period." The New York Observer describes the opera as "just about everything you want opera to be. The Rose Elf shocked, confounded, disturbed and in the end, exalted."

CHRISTOPHER MATTALIANO, Founder, General & Artistic Director

Christopher Mattaliano founded OrpheusPDX in 2022 and serves as the company's General and Artistic Director. He was the Artistic Director of the Pine Mountain Music Festival from 2001-2003 and General Director of Portland Opera from 2003-2019. The highlights of his 16 years at Portland Opera include the expansion of programming and artistic standards, the creation of the young artists residency program, the regular engagement of women conductors, directors, and designers, and wide-ranging collaborations with most of Portland's music, theater, dance, and visual art organizations, as well as groups like Trans Affirming Spaces and Phame. Under his leadership, the company greatly increased its educational and community outreach programs, including offering the company's first bilingual opera production, and providing free access to local communities and thousands of students throughout the state. This led to the company's being awarded the 2017 Governor's Arts Award. Mattaliano was recently named as one of 75 key figures in opera over the last 50 years by *OPERA America* as part of its 50th Anniversary Oral History project.
